# **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE**

Year 2019 was a fulfillment of that statement. After feedback sessions with stakeholders and volunteers, our team noted that we didn't need to "promote volunteerism"—truth is, Singaporeans love to give their time and resources towards a worthy cause, as best as they can. What our job is, is to design volunteering experiences to allow more individuals to be involved in a meaningful manner, sustainably.

There will be groups of volunteers who enjoy a regular service experience: seeing the impact of their volunteering on their beneficiaries over time, and building meaningful relationships with fellow volunteers. Then, there are volunteers who wish to set aside two or three days of their annual calendar to participate in a project that aids our agency in serving our clients. Both groups of volunteers are important.

In 2019, through 29 events and programmes, we saw a total of 1,011 volunteers serving in projects and 144 service volunteers making a difference in the lives of more than 414 beneficiaries on a regular basis.

As Singapore matures, there will be a greater need for eldercare services. In CHCSA, we believe that eldercare work is not just about doing what is necessary for our seniors, but what is memorable for them. The best way to honor the sacrifices of these pioneers is for us to enrich their silver years through exciting and meaningful programmes.

After almost 9 years, House of Joy Mountbatten is now well-accepted and well-loved by the community. In December 2019, we moved our annual Christmas party from our center to the public field in the area, so that we could involve the larger community in our celebrations. From the playground, choir

members from City Harvest Church sang carols, cheered on by those living in the blocks. It was a wonderful feeling.

We decked our Christmas tent with fairy lights, and brought to the community magic shows, carnival booths and even jugglers. However, our celebration was met by the monsoon rain.

Even though our carpet floors were now wet, and there remained a slight drizzle, the House of Joy seniors came dressed in their Christmas best, carrying their umbrellas. Their appearance brought smiles to our team of volunteers and staff. That was one of the best Christmas parties we have ever had.

Earlier in 2019, we participated in a tender to operate another senior activity center in the new Tampines Greenweave estate. The tender attracted more than five organisations, but we managed to obtain it. House of Joy Tampines Greenweave is slated to start operations in September 2020.

Thank you volunteers, donors, beneficiaries, partners and staff for doing good together with us—it really is better with all of you.

# **ELDERCARE SERVICES**

### **COPE - COMMUNITY OUTREACH PROGRAMME** FOR THE ELDERLY

The Pioneer Generation deserves the best and most forthcoming attention and care. When we partnered with the South East Community Development Council for the Community Outreach Programme for the Elderly (COPE) in 1999, we did so with the intention to befriend and reach out to the elderly who are vulnerable and at risk of social isolation.

In 2019, with the help of our COPE volunteers, we visited 21 blocks in the Mountbatten area and 12 in Toa Payoh, where we managed to identify, respectively, 359 and 55 vulnerable elderly individuals.

2019 also marked the first time that we partnered with Tan Tock Seng Hospital and the Singapore General Hospital to form the Community Nurse Team. In addition to screenings for the elderly at House of Joy, these Community Nurse Teams would work with our caseworkers through referrals and joint home visits on the weekdays to check on their health.

Besides conducting visitations, we kept the elderly engaged through community events held in their neighbourhood. Our programme, Happy Kampung has proven successful as seniors get to know fellow seniors living near them, forming meaningful friendship, through games and refreshments.

In 2019, some of our volunteers went the extra mile to celebrate Deepavali with our Indian seniors, bringing them gifts and meaningful notes.

### **HOUSE OF JOY**

Coupled with our COPE Programme, our House of Joy Centre at Pine Close keeps our seniors engaged with programmes that encourage a sense of community and self-development. These programmes span a wide range of topics and activities, such as - Rummikub, Wheelchair Yoga and even a Lasting Power of Attorney workshop to educate them on estate planning.

We also started niche activities like Calligraphy and Mahjong, which have garnered positive responses and interest from the elderly. We collaborated with another centre to hold a Rummikub Competition, where over 120 elderly played competitively and non-competitively. It was the first event of its kind in Singapore.

With a target of 15 programmes, we exceeded expectations and ran a total of 20 programmes in 2019, reaching a cumulative number of 898 elderly. We want nothing more than to keep giving the elderly an opportunity to learn and grow during this stage of their lives.

# FAMILY SERVICES

Family is what turns a house into a home. Our Family Services clients come from all walks of life, and may include our elderly beneficiaries and even members of the public.

We never know when tough times may hit. Whether it's a sudden loss of income, a diagnosis of a critical illness or a loss in the family, CHCSA supports our clients through constant check-ins, mentoring of youth, providing referrals and interim financial aid.

In 2019, we collaborated with more social workers to help families in need. In total, we handled 169 cases and worked with 4 other agencies for 9 cases.

We supported Mr Alan\*, who was referred to us by his Family Service Centre social worker. He is the sole breadwinner in his family of four and is working as a Grab driver. Due to a major surgery, he was unable to work for three to six months, which led to their home mortgage, school fees and medical bills being in arrears. The family also struggled with daily expenses. CHCSA was able to provide the family with interim support to supplement their daily expenses for two months. When Mr Alan was certified fit to resume driving, we supported him via our Fresh Start scheme to pay for his rental and deposit for a new rental car so he could start bringing income for his family. Mr Alan is still driving today.

# YOUTH (CITY COLLEGE)

There are no youths-at-risk, but youths with promise looking for instruction, mentorship, education and love. Founded in 2002, City College gives its students a second chance at their education. We provide them with the preparation needed to take their national GCE 'N' and 'O' examinations, gaining the certification to spur them on to higher learning.

There were a total of 45 students who enrolled and graduated in 2019.



# YOUTH (HIGHER)

We are into our second year with Higher, and we hold on to the vision of offering fresh and new ways to live and give as a community and to our mission to create new and fresh experiences for youth.

In early 2019, we wrapped up our first run of the Higher Growth Track, our 4-step programme that helps youth Experience Hope, Find Community, Discover Purpose and Make a Difference. This programme inspires, educates and empowers youth to change the narrative of their lives.

Youths on the Higher Growth Track received the opportunity to go through leadership workshops and training to prepare them to make a difference in the community. Their 'final project' included being part of the planning committee of volunteers that ran *Come Play Play*, our annual sports community event, with 53 teams consisting of 490 participants.











We conducted a second run of the Higher Growth Track in November 2019, featuring our milestone event *City King*, which saw over 600 youth participants joining us. Additionally, there were a total of 164 volunteers who took time to help with the manning of game stations, of which 75% of these were adults looking to give back to the community and to young people.











# VOLUNTEER MANAGEMENT

The regular support of our volunteers is very important. 2019 saw 131 Regular Volunteers helping out on a monthly basis and a whopping 1,151 Event Volunteers supporting 29 events held, with 309 of them being first-time volunteers. Our youth events, Come Play Play and City King, saw the most volunteers, 276 in total.

Regular volunteers fall into two groups: those that serve COPE and those that participate in the "Drink Coffee Do Good" community project. Volunteers that support our COPE programme visit the elderly and interact with them monthly, while volunteer baristas for the "Drink Coffee Do Good" project serve the community by brewing cups of strong coffee at the pop-up café before and after City Harvest Church's weekend services at Suntec Singapore.

To improve their capability to handle the elderly, our COPE volunteers were trained to spot and handle seniors with dementia. They also learned about the different kinds of mobility aids and how to use them properly, in addition to wheelchair transfer skills.

# **COMMUNITY PROJECT**





May 2016 marked the start of our "Drink Coffee, Do Good" community project to encourage City Harvest Church attendees to give back to  $\,$ the community. The pop-up café runs on weekends before and after church services at their Suntec premises. Featuring hand-crafted coffee, the café has a pay-as-you-wish system, where the funds go into helping the beneficiaries of CHCSA, primarily families in need.

In 2019, with the help of 25 volunteer baristas, a total of 4062 cups were sold and more than \$18,000 was raised.





# **GOVERNANCE**



The Board is supported by five working committees. They have the authority to examine issues related to their portfolio and report back to the Board on their findings and recommendations. There were one Annual General Meeting and three board meetings over the period of January to December 2018.



CHCSA's annual financial statements are prepared in accordance with the provisions of the Societies Act (Chapter 311), Charities Act (Chapter 37) and the Charities Accounting Standards.



The performance appraisal exercise for staff members was completed in early December 2018. The remuneration committee reviewed the performance, salary structure and guidelines in December 2018. The annual remuneration for each of the top three key executives in CHCSA remains within the \$100,000 salary band.
